

In our Green Issue of June '08 we first talked to Freddy from Bikeys who had been exploring the possibility of bringing cycle manufacturing to Gisborne. Economic imperatives led Freddy to look around at the possibility of using locally sourced materials, but when he happened upon bamboo, his undertaking took on a whole new significance.

One year later we caught up with Freddy to see where he was at:

"I'm heading off to the Philippines in July to participate in a training session on bamboo bike production. I'll be meeting Craig Calfee in person. He's the guy I've been in contact with this past year while I've been playing around with different processes. Craig has set up Bamboosero, which helps entrepreneurs in developing countries start businesses making bamboo bikes.

When I come back I'll become a broker for Bamboosero, importing the bamboo bike frames, stocking them and building them up into higher end models. I use a flax and high quality epoxy mix to bind the parts, other places generally use hemp.

So people will soon have a choice. The bamboo bike creates less of an ecological footprint, and wins hands down comfort and performance-wise, as long as you don't mind how they look. They will be very competitively priced and contribute to a good cause.

It's random. Finally I've found a way that I'll be able to build these prototypes I've had in my head for so long, and do the whole process from start to finish".

Towards a Critical Mass

A banana seat, ape hanger handlebars and a flag were de rigueur in the '70s when Manu Caddie got his first bike to hoon around his local neighbourhood. Today the pragmatic synergies of soaring petrol costs and improving fitness are good enough reasons to for anyone to take to cycling around our gorgeous city.

Manu is aware though that there are also plenty of reasons why people choose not to ride their bikes around Gisborne, and in August of last year, upon hearing of yet another cyclist hit by a motorist, promptly joined Gisborne up with 300 cities around the world to the 'Critical Mass' movement.

Coined 'political protest riders', Critical Mass cyclists draw attention to their right to ride safely on city roads. Blocking traffic in a commute clot is how it all started in San Francisco but here in Gissy we go with the peaceful awareness approach - just getting out on the roads together actively sharing the roads with cars and trucks.

"When enough people take up cycling a critical mass of cyclists eventually reaches numbers when everyone wants to get biking. This moment - the tipping point - will be when we all consider cycling our usual form of safe transport."

"It simply makes sense to bike in Gisborne - the roads are mostly flat, it is good for the environment, our health and of course household finances" Manu reiterates as he issues an open invitation for all to join the 'march on wheels' "Cyclists gather at Marina Car park by 12.15pm on the last Friday of every month and make their way through town - there is solidarity in a group which can help those nervous about getting back on the road"

Manu is also the Chairperson of the recently formed Cycling Advisory Group which will provide input and advice into the cycling activities and services carried out by Gisborne District Council. "Cycle-safety is the motivator" says Manu who has schools, mountainbikers, BMXers, cycle clubs, Gisborne Cycle and Walkway Trust members all talking together with the Gisborne District Council to keep Gisborne on track to becoming a truly cycle-friendly city.

The world of High Visibility:

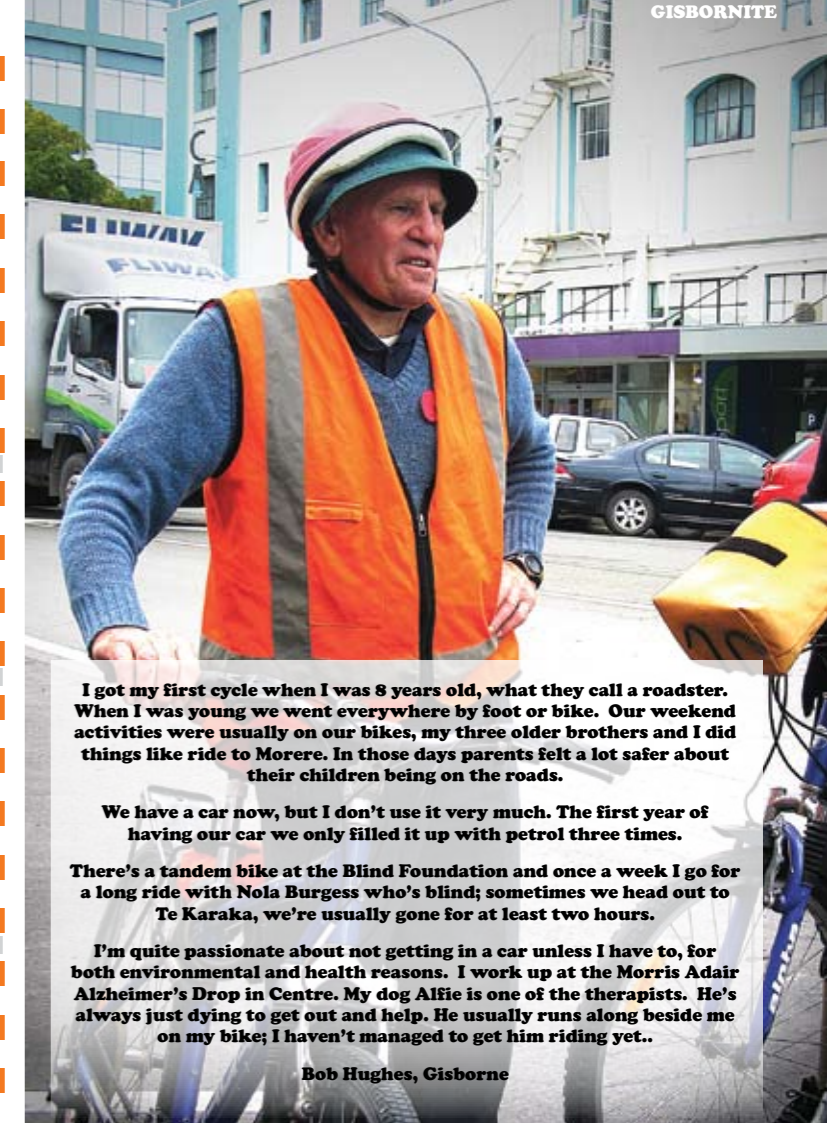
High Visibility paraphernalia is one of the unfortunate side effects of modern day cycling. The onus has been firmly placed upon the smallest road-user to ensure that every other man and his dog within a 3 kilometre radius cannot miss them. Even if that man and his dog might be getting in a little shut eye behind the wheel, or brushing up on their multitasking capabilities as they speed in late to work...

For those of us who have been less enthusiastic about a return to the fluorescent hues that made their horrific debut in the eighties and have recently staged an equally awful comeback, and those of us that are keen to spend a lot of time on our bicycles, this modern day view of high viz gear as the most obvious solution to our road safety woes, has been a blow indeed!

There are, of course, benefits to riding in a highly visible manner. For one, I appreciate the new kudos I seem to have acquired since adopting high viz, from other high viz users like people working on the roads, posties and strangely, people driving around in their cars (perhaps traffic safety in Gisborne really is much worse than we thought!). I acknowledge that I've got my new orange vest to thank for a whole lot more eyebrows-up action these days.

And it's not just my eyebrows getting more of a work out; I'm speedier than ever before, as I fly along State Highway 35, down low behind the bars. But I'd be lying if I said that aerodynamics was behind my new riding style. My aim is invisibility, a contradiction in terms I know, when a fluro orange vest envelopes not only my entire upper torso, but also the bulk of my backpack, and my fluro orange flag with silver reflector stripe flaps madly in my wake. I'm a giant orange monster and all I can do is smile apologetically, when you catch my reluctant eye.

The perception that high viz gear is essential for cycle survival in Gisborne may well be as much of a deterrent to people taking up cycling as the fear of dodgy car drivers itself..
Bring on the cycle ways!



I got my first cycle when I was 8 years old, what they call a roadster. When I was young we went everywhere by foot or bike. Our weekend activities were usually on our bikes, my three older brothers and I did things like ride to Morere. In those days parents felt a lot safer about their children being on the roads.

We have a car now, but I don't use it very much. The first year of having our car we only filled it up with petrol three times.

There's a tandem bike at the Blind Foundation and once a week I go for a long ride with Nola Burgess who's blind; sometimes we head out to Te Karaka, we're usually gone for at least two hours.

I'm quite passionate about not getting in a car unless I have to, for both environmental and health reasons. I work up at the Morris Adair Alzheimer's Drop in Centre. My dog Alfie is one of the therapists. He's always just dying to get out and help. He usually runs along beside me on my bike; I haven't managed to get him riding yet..
